## Federation of Small Businesses

- Established in 1974 to lobby on behalf of our members
- 170,000 members across the UK
- Largest sectors: retail (20%), professional services (18%), manufacturing (12%)
- Average number of employees working for member companies: seven employees
- 5.7 million SMEs in the UK







- 77% of small businesses within the UK are part of supply chains
- 17% of small businesses operate their own global supply chain and ¾ of these supply chains move through the EU single market.
- 1 in 10 of small firms are part of another company's global supply chain – with the majority (89%) of these moving through the EU single market.
- So 21% of small businesses could be meaningfully affected by these changes
- Of those small firms operating supply chains operating through the EU, 20% would consider moving all or some of their supply chain to the EU single market.
- By contrast only 9% would of this subset would consider moving more or all of their supply chain to the UK

### **Impact of Brexit**

1 in 5 small firms with an **EU** supply chain will consider **moving more or all** of their supply chain to the EU







# Brexit Impact on Small Suppliers

"I can already see my input costs rising. At the same time, my export customer base is getting a bit shaky. Relocation of the business to the continent looks like the most viable solution"




What should small businesses be thinking about in the eventuality of a no deal?
